

1. Introduction

School uniform plays a valuable role in contributing to the ethos of our school, demonstrating membership of a school community and pride in representing this community.

2. Aims

School uniform plays a valuable role in contributing to the ethos of our school, demonstrating membership of a school community and pride in representing this community.

Our policy on school uniform is based on the notion that school uniform supports effective teaching and learning since it:

- Promotes a sense of pride in the school
- Engenders a sense of community and belonging
- Supports positive behaviour and discipline
- Is practical and smart, hardwearing and reasonable in cost. All items other than the sweatshirt/cardigan can be bought from any high street store or supermarket
- Identifies the children with the school and encourages identity within the school
- Protects children from social pressures to dress in a particular way
- Makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance and helps nurture cohesion between different groups of children
- Ensures children of all cultures, races and backgrounds feel welcome
- Is designed with health and safety in mind

3. The Uniform

All children should wear:

- Red sweatshirt or cardigan (with or without the Bidbury Infant School Logo)
- White polo shirt with a collar
- Grey smart trousers, skirt or pinafore, or shorts in warm weather
- Red/white checked summer dress in warm weather
- Grey/black tights or socks
- Smart black shoes with simple fastening and minimal decoration

For PE, children are able to wear:

- Any labelled T-shirt
- Any labelled shorts
- Plimsolls
- Jogging bottoms for cold weather

4. Jewellery

On health and safety grounds we do not allow children to wear jewellery in our school. The exceptions to this rule are plain, simple earring studs in pierced ears (one pair maximum) and watches. We ask parents wishing children to have pierced ears to get piercing done at the start of the summer holidays so that earrings can be removed for PE lessons from the start of the new term. Where this is not possible, we ask for the children to either remove these objects during PE and games or cover them with tape or a plaster to prevent them from causing injury. All jewellery must be removed for PE and we cannot accept any responsibility for lost items.

5. Footwear

The school wants all children to grow into healthy young adults. We believe that it is dangerous for children to wear shoes that have platform soles or high heels and we do not allow children to wear such shoes in our school. We welcome children walking to school in boots or wellies, but once in school, they should change into their normal school shoes and place their boots in a bag on their peg.

6. Hair

All children, girls and boys, are requested to tie hair up where it is long enough to do so. This is for both health and safety reasons and to look smart and ready for school. Hair must be tied up in PE.

7. General Presentation

No nail varnish or make up is permitted.

8. The Role of Parents

We ask all parents who send their children to follow the school uniform policy. We believe that parents have a duty to send their children to school correctly dressed and ready for their daily school work. One of the responsibilities of parents is to ensure that their child has their correct uniform and that it is clean and in good repair.

If any parent would like the school to modify the uniform policy, they should make a representation to the Headteacher in the first instance. The school welcomes children from all backgrounds and faith communities. If there are serious reasons e.g. on religious grounds, why parents need their children to wear clothes that differ from the school uniform, the school will respond to such requests on an individual basis.

9. The Role of Governors

The Governing Body supports the Headteacher in implementing the school uniform policy. It considers all representations from parents regarding the uniform policy and liaises with the Headteacher to ensure the policy is implemented fairly and with sensitivity.

It is the Governors' responsibility to ensure that the school uniform meets all regulations concerning equal opportunities.

Governors ensure that the school uniform policy helps children to dress sensibly, in clothing that is hard-wearing, safe and practical.

10. Monitoring and Review

The Governing Body monitors and reviews the school uniform policy through its work by:

- Seeking the view of parents to ensure they agree with and support the policy
- Considering, with the Headteacher, any requests from parents for individual children to have a special dispensation with regard to school uniform
- Requiring the Headteacher to report to the Governors on the way the school uniform is implemented
